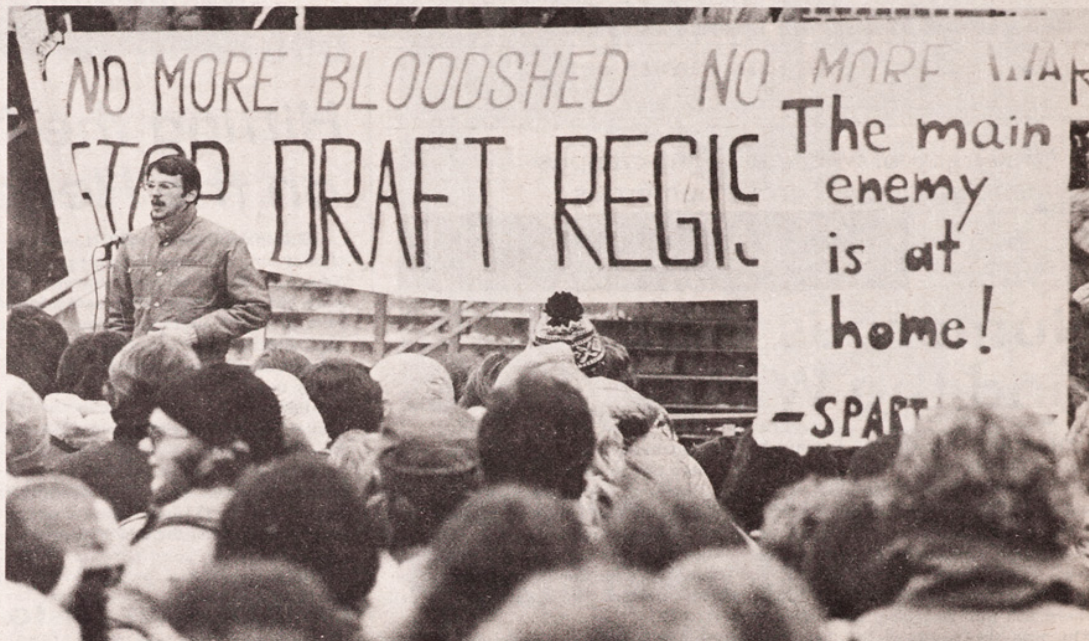

The draft is back.

Unbelievable as that seems, after years of work to rid the Selective Service system from the lives of our young people, Congress and the President are once again preparing to reinstate the draft for young men, and possibly women, between 18 and 26 years of age.

President Carter has asked Congress to appropriate \$10 million to register all young people—including veterans and

Where Are They Now?

Senator Donald Riegle and Representative Dale Kildee were candidates for peace in the late 60's.

But today, things are different. Riegle supports the draft and Kildee isn't sure.

What has happened to the anti-war politicians of Flint?

In 1966, when Donald Riegle first ran for Congress as a Republican, he was a strong supporter of the war in Vietnam. As the years went on he grew more distrustful of what the Pentagon was saying. He also grew more philosophical about the morality of war and soon became one of the strongest doves and harshest critics of the Vietnam War.

In 1972, he was the only Congressman to support Rep. Paul McCloskey in a challenge against Richard Nixon at the Republican convention. Throughout his own campaign for re-election, he

spoke passionately against the war and voted time after time against the military.

Privately, he admitted to friends that he voted for George McGovern for president.

In 1973 he joined the Democratic Party and in 1976 he defeated superhawk Robert Griffin for the Senate.

Today, though, Riegle is no dove. He supports the reinstatement of draft registration. He supports the \$20 billion increase in the military budget. Often, he votes for what the Pentagon wants.

He also wants to get re-elected in 1982 and perhaps this is why he's chosen the safe route.

Riegle refused to speak to the *Voice* despite numerous attempts to talk with him at his Washington office.

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Here's How They'll Vote:

If the Michigan delegation to the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives is any indication of which way the wind is blowing regarding the draft, then things don't look good for those who are between 18 and 26. In a survey conducted by the Flint Voice and the Public Interest Research Group in Michigan, only 2 Congresspersons said they were definitely opposed to the draft with 3 others leaning against it. 9 were in favor of the draft or leaning that way, while 4 were undecided or had no comment.

Of our two Senators, one was in favor and the other wasn't sure.

One thing that was sure among all of the representatives was their terrible uneasiness with this issue; they don't look forward to having to vote on this one. So, if you want to put the heat on them, now is the time. Here's how:
