

Who Murdered Robert Robertson?

A short while later, Robert Spencer Robertson, a black man from Flint, was dead, a bullet shot between his eyes.

About 30 minutes later, Robertson decided to cook the rest of the squirrel. He needed a longer stick so he got up from the campfire to look for one.

After walking just a few feet from the blazing fire, a single, precise shot rang out and struck him slightly right to dead center between his eyes. He fell to the ground, probably dead at that instant.

James and Fred were stunned. Their first reaction was that Robert was faking it, a practical joke, they thought.

As they got up from the fire and approached Robert, a volley of shots
